ICE BUCKET CHALLENGE



On Friday 23rd May, staff at Admiral Lord Nelson School braved the chill as they took part in the Ice Bucket Challenge to raise money for the mental health charity M.I.N.D.

In a lively and laughter-filled afternoon, students had the honour of dousing their teachers with icy water, cheering as each brave volunteer was soaked in support of a worthy cause. The event, which took place in the HUMS playground, drew a large crowd of pupils and staff, all eager to witness their teachers' reactions as buckets of freezing water were poured over their heads.

The chilly challenge was part of a wider fundraising effort that also included a school bake sale, where students and staff sold homemade cakes, cookies, and other sweet treats. Altogether, the school community raised an impressive £433.75 for M.I.N.D., a charity that supports people experiencing mental health struggles across England and Wales, and campaigns to improve mental health services.







In a heartwarming initiative for Mental Health Awareness Month, students at Admiral Lord Nelson School came together to design impactful posters and create "Hearts of Hope" to promote mental well-being and solidarity within our community.

The project, aimed at fostering open conversations about mental health, encouraged students to channel their creativity into meaningful artwork. The posters, bursting with vibrant colors and uplifting messages, highlight themes of resilience, kindness, and the importance of seeking support. From slogans like "It's Okay to Not Be Okay" to illustrations of self-care practices, the designs reflect the students' deep empathy and understanding of mental health challenges.








JAMIE OLIVER WORLD RECORD!










